## English translation of al-ḥājj 'Umar b. Abī Bakr praise poem: Kete-Krachi mosque

In the name of God, the Beneficent, the Merciful.

God's blessings and peace be upon our Lord Muhammad, his family, his companions, his wives and offspring.

- 1. We thank the Lord who spread out cradles, And raised mountains like poles,
- 2. Needless of any helper, Or spouse or children.
- 3. I bear witness that He is the God of creation. He is beyond presentation and has no adversaries.
- 4. Then may His blessings continuously be showered Upon the messenger who came with guidance;
- 5. With peace also; likewise upon his family And the totality of companions and fighters.
- 6. Now, the purpose of this composition Is in listing names of the patrons.
- 7. They are virtuous people and sincere friends of God. They are generous people and most pious servants.
- 8. They have generously assisted in reconstructing the edifice, Because they are benevolent people.
- 9. May our God reward them with goodness, Protection, rewards and support.<sup>1</sup>
- 10. The greatest helper was the leader<sup>2</sup> of the zongo,<sup>3</sup> Salaw.<sup>4</sup> He is a unique person.
- 11. He has assisted us severally, without any doubt. Every one present in the country can bear witness to that.
- 12. He has assisted us with graciousness: with paving stones, And with lime and paper.
- 13. May God recompense him abundantly With goodness, happiness and a long life.
- 14. He is followed by Garba. His mother is Maywanki.<sup>5</sup> Then follows Adusi, conqueror of the envious.
- 15. His reward is with God of the worlds,

- 16. Forget not a wise one, a youth most outstanding. That is Bāwa<sup>7</sup>, giver from treasures long bequeathed.
- 17. He is of Mai Sūnā<sup>8</sup>'s descendants, a native of Kano. His deeds surpass hand counting.
- 18. God's mercy be upon his father, As well as his mother and the rest of ancestors.
- 19. Likewise his son, who has truly helped, Malam Baraw<sup>9</sup>, his father like Hādi's father.<sup>10</sup>
- 20. And the owner of lands in the country, He has assisted us with great donations.
- 21. That is Ibrāhīm. May God reward him With more recompenses and happiness.
- 22. Likewise our Alī, popularly known as Baraw, Great sympathizer, he has assisted with money.
- 23. May our Lord save him from evils, In this world and the hereafter.
- 24. And Yūsuf, our student, has also assisted, Imām Of his town, the happiest of all towns.
- 25. Akara<sup>11</sup> Kojo<sup>12</sup> has also assisted us a lot. May he be wrapped in goodness like a scabbard.
- 26. Forget not one who is like a thousand, Al-ḥājj 'Uthmān of noble ancestry,
- 27. Subduer of scoundrels and riffraff, Upholder of truth for the noble.
- 28. Our son and grandchild, Mubārak, Our student, but one of the lions,
- 29. He has assisted us with white silver, Without delay or procrastination.
- 30. God's mercy be upon his father, As well as his father's father in the tombs.
- 31. Mention our father, merchant of silk brocades And sarcenet and precious garments,
- 32. Of Indian fabric as well as European, Roman and African as well as Turkish,

33. Russian weave and Turkish weave, That is Abū Bakr. He is among the unique ones.

34. He has assisted us greatly and it is well known. May God reward him with revenues.

35. Muḥammad Sāni, 13 Abū Ngari, 14 Resident of Salaga, 15 say, he is among the noble.

36. He has extended his hand of assistance to us. His deed is of eternal paradise.

37. He extended us a hand of assistance. His deed is a worthy deed.

38. May God's mercy be upon his father. May He house him in eternal paradise.

39. Mention Abū Salaga, grandchild of Lāmi. He has assisted the pious most prominently.

40. May our Lord reward him with what he desires, In this world and the hereafter.

41. With regards to Sulaymān, the people's Imām, His assistance was in manifolds.

42. He assisted privately and publicly.

May the Lord of creation reward him for his needs,

43. In this world and the hereafter.

Amen, by the chapter of *wa-al-ād*. 16

44. The leader<sup>17</sup> of the *zongo*, Khālid from Yelwa, <sup>18</sup> That is our attendant without hesitation.

45. He was assisting us according to his capacity. May his reward be multiplied without exhaustion.

46. Our Aḥmad, Kōmin Dare, <sup>19</sup> was a worthy helper. He assisted us with straw<sup>20</sup> and money.

47. We ask our Lord to reward him With wealth, blessings and support.

48. Mai Sūna, the senior, has assisted us Previously with slaves and provisions.

- 50. It is befitting that we mention Abdullah, Our landlord, without heresy.
- 51. That is the Zarma, <sup>22</sup> the free born, Who obeys our word submissively.
- 52. He has assisted us intermittently, yes! May our Lord protect him from evil,
- 53. In all his affairs and businesses,
  For the sake of he<sup>23</sup> who was sent with guidance.
- 54. As for Kalankulay, he has assisted us. May God help him for the sake of Ṣād.<sup>24</sup>
- 55. That is Muḥammad Qarātu<sup>25</sup> notably, Leader<sup>26</sup> of Alfay, without parallel.
- 56. We ask God, for the sake of Jesus<sup>27</sup>
  To protect him from the plots of the evil.
- 57. And it is at this juncture that we will mention Abdullah, Leader<sup>28</sup> of Yendi<sup>29</sup>, with mighty army.
- 58. He has assisted us in renovating the building, With his wealth, in cash and gold.
- 59. May God grant him long life
  In his rule and save him from malice.
- 60. Aḥmad Jatigi, 30 blessed merchant, Has assisted us with money and benefits.
- 61. We ask our Lord to augment his wealth Multiple folds eternally.
- 62. We complete this composition with Malam Manzō,<sup>31</sup> Very courteous towards every caller.
- 63. He has sincerely assisted us.

  We give him thanks forever lasting.
- 64. His assistance came in a hard time, When all provisions were exhausted.
